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### Rocky Ford School now on National and State Historic Registers

Rocky Ford School is now on the National Register of Historic Places. Originally built in 1903 as a replacement for an earlier structure, this oneroom schoolhouse is a reminder of Riley County's 19th and early 20th century educational system. The school is a one-story, gable-roofed, native limestone structure exhibiting the vernacular style of many Midwestern country schools. After a 1927 fire destroyed all but the stone walls, the school was rebuilt in a manner to maintain its architectural integrity.

When you enter the furnished school through its west door, it is easy to imagine the teacher at her desk welcoming students for the day. Rules for teachers and students are displayed in the entry along with pictures of students. One group photo dates to 1908.

In 1987 the Manhattan School District No. 383 gave the Rocky Ford School to the Riley County Historical Society. Founded in 1914, as a non-profit organization incorporated in the State of Kansas, the Society collects, preserves, and displays historical records and items of Riley County and the State of Kansas by encouraging interest in local history. Its partial mission includes educating local and state citizens, including students.

### Some reminiscences from one-room school days

Here are some excerpts from letters we have received about attending a one-room school. These were not people who had attended Rocky Ford but were from one-room school attendance.

"I went kicking and screaming! My way of life was being changed by force." My sister Virginia had gone to school for three years. She rode our horse "old pet". I had always set in the saddle and reined Pet as I rode around our par-

ents pasture, but this time Dad set me behind the saddle. I stayed only after the real good "butt warming", richly deserved. Dad's final words as we departed for school were, "If you don't mind the teacher and you get a spanking, you'll just think it was a spanking when you get home".

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My first day was especially memorable. At the end of the morning classes when the noon hour

rolled around, our teacher reminded me that it was now time for me to run home for lunch. Looking around the room and noting that no one else was leaving, I stood my ground and emphatically shook my red-head 'No'! The teacher advised me that the agreement was for half days only, at which point I lifted my little foot and kicked her right in the shins and then proceeded to spit at her! Luckily my dad was driving a

tractor in the field across from the school. (could he have anticipated trouble from his feisty little off-spring?) Brother ran through the field to get dad who arrived with a big grin on his face. He playfully flipped me up on his shoulder as we headed for the tractor and home. Despite all, I was allowed to continue and so at age five I went to kindergarten in a oneroom school. Do you know.... I always loved school.

### Historical Society restoring and maintaining school

The RCHS is restoring and maintaining this old Rocky Ford school. Work has included removing vines on the exterior, replacing the roof, and repairing and installing glass doors in the school's built-in bookcases. A generous Riley County family recently donated a piano for the school room, and a flag now flies on the

school's flagpole during special occasions.
Currently we are starting repair to the interior of the building by having the ceiling cracks and holes refinished. It has been in quite a mess and so have the side walls but only enough money has been generated to do the ceiling.
We are planning to have some events this sum-

mer and fall. We hope all of you can come and see what remains to be done.

Once the interior is finished, Riley County school children can once again attend the school to participate in historic schoolroom and playground activities and gain insight in historical experiences of youngsters of the past.



### Rural Schools of Riley County provides information on Rocky Ford School

Rural Schools of Riley County, written by Jim Bogart, Roger Brannan, Doris Setterquist, Charles Setterquist, and Doug Tippin provides the following information on school attendance, subjects taught, and test questions asked.

Students from the first to eighth grade attended the school, and subjects taught included orthography, grammar, reading, geography, writing and arithmetic. In 1895 12 students attended the school, and the teacher earned \$30.00 per month. Classes were held on a six-month basis. Seventeen young scholars attended the school in 1929, and the teacher received \$100 per month for an eight-month teaching period. By 1945 a mere 10 students were en-

rolled, and a grand total of 78 volumes filled the library shelves.

Eighth graders of the past were required to take a test at the county seat before they could advance to high school. Listed are some of the questions asked.

- 1. Give the advantages to you of writing a neat, rapid and legible hand.
- 2. Name five selections in

Eighth Grade Classics studied this year and the author of each.

- 3. Explain States Rights, Nullification, and Succession.
- 4. Write two simple, two complex, and two compound sentences.
- 5. State the number of cubic feet in a ton of thoroughly settled hay. Give the rule for finding the hay in a mow.
