State Climatologist to Speak at April 15 Meeting

State Service Climatologist Mary Knapp will be the featured speaker at the quarterly meeting of the Riley County Historical Society on Tuesday, April 15. Knapp has a unique position in Kansas State University's Department of Agronomy. She is responsible for establishing and maintaining a statewide network of equipment for gathering weather data and answering questions on climate and weather matters. She also maintains the website that provides a constant update and complete archive of weather-related data for Kansas. The program, open to all, will begin about 7:15 p.m.

The Rocky Ford Committee of the Riley County Historical Society invites you and your family and friends to an Open House on Saturday, April 26, from 2 to 4 p.m., at the Rocky Ford School House. This historic school house is located at the intersection of Tuttle Creek Boulevard and Barnes Road, just a few miles north of Manhattan. Refreshments will be served. Parking is available at the Faith Evangelical Free Church, 1921 Barnes Road.

Rocky Ford School is a one-room limestone schoolhouse that was built in 1903. The building served first through eighth grade students in District 70 until consolidation with District 1 in 1938. Although consolidation had been a topic of discussion during District 70 board meetings as early as 1921, patrons chose to rebuild the school after a fire nearly destroyed it in 1927. Builder Fred Hulse used the original limestone during the reconstruction.

Various repairs and improvements were made to the property within its first two decades. An outhouse was built in 1904. A well was first excavated in 1909, and a new well was dug in 1933. A merry-go-round was installed in 1929.

In 1987, U.S.D. 383 gave the school to the Historical Society with the understanding that it would be used for historical purposes.

The Rocky Ford School committee, chaired by Doug Tippin and composed of other RCHS board members and volunteers, has made additional improvements to the exterior and interior in recent years.



Area Elementary Students Tour the Riley County Historical Museum, Goodnow House, and Hartford House

More than 1,200 elementary students have been scheduled to tour the Riley County Historical Museum during the early months of 2014. One hundred first and second grade students (pictured above) celebrated Kansas Day (January 29) at the Museum.

The Riley County Historical Museum is partnering with the Beach Museum of Art to offer tours to area elementary school children. The "Picturing Kansas: Journey to the Prairie" tours focus on early settlement, home and family life, and weather for Kindergarten through third grade students and on exploration, settlement of Kansas, and Kansas in the Civil War for students in grades four through six. Morning tour groups, either at the Riley County Historical Museum or the Beach Museum of Art, eat sack lunches before being bused to the other museum for the afternoon.

The art at the Beach Museum and the historical museum's artifacts and historic properties complement each other well. Kathrine Schlageck, senior educator at the Beach Museum, and Allana Parker, Curator of Design at the historical museum, organized the tours, which started in January and will go through May.
